# HISTORY: OUR ORIGIN STORY

San Mateo County is one of the wealthiest counties in the country and is home to some of the most innovative companies in the world, yet faces intractable challenges like significant poverty, lack of affordable housing, persistent inequities, and the accelerating impact of climate change. Despite its resources and reputation for collaboration, the county is limited by private, public, and nonprofit sectors that often work in their own silos, and 20 cities and multiple unincorporated areas that naturally focus on their own issues. And too often, people of color are not represented in the ranks of leadership and do not have a seat at the table when decisions are made.




# WHAT MAKES US UNIQUE?






## WE ARE DIVERSE

LEADERS CREATE NEW RESTORATIVE-JUSTICE PROGRAM FOR SAN MATEO COUNTY YOUTH

Thanks to connections created at Leadership Council SMC's CORPS Program, Peer Point, a new restorative-justice program, will make a difference for San Mateo County youth.

Karin Huber-Levy, Vice Chair of the SMC's Juvenile Justice & Delinquency Prevention Commission ("the Commission"), and Kate Wilson, Gilead Foundation President, met as fellow participants in Leadership Council SMC's CORPS Class of 2022.

Together they coordinated the funding of Peer Point, a new restorative justice program for SMC youth with a \$500,000 grant from Gilead Foundation's Creating Possible Fund. With funding secured, the Commission turned to Kate Hiester, Regional Director of <u>Fresh</u> <u>Lifelines for Youth (FLY)</u>, to manage the program. FLY was the perfect partner to help ensure Peer Point's long term success given its proven success in partnering with highneeds youth. After discussions, planning, and preparations, the team at FLY assumed management and launched Peer Point.



The **collaboration** and **trust** that was fostered when Karin Huber-Levy met Kate Wilson at Leadership CORPS has led to **action** that made the Peer Point Program a reality for youth in San Mateo County.

### RENAISSANCE ENTREPRENEURSHIP CENTER RECEIVES GRANTS TO HELP LAUNCH CHILDCARE ENTREPRENEURS


During 2023, the Renaissance Entrepreneurship Center (RenCenter) received grants to fund the expansion of child care resources in northern San Mateo County.

This was a direct result of a small group of private sector, nonprofit, and community leaders from the Leadership CORPS Class of 2023 working on a project that centered on the challenges of access to early childhood education for all in San Mateo County.

As part of the team's final recommendations, the group provided actionable near-term steps and solutions to address workforce development and retention challenges. The work resulted in an award to RenCenter and the creation of a Small Grant and Capacity Building Program to Support Family Childcare. RenCenter received \$70,000 in Measure K funding and another \$50,000 in funding from SVCF for implementation in 2023-2024. 



## FINANCIAL REPORT FISCAL YEAR 2023

Revenues grew significantly this year due primarily to the addition of our second Leadership Immersion Program — Emerging Leaders. Continued support from grants, and contributions from the County, our city partners, and corporate sponsors allowed for a surplus at year-end positioning us well for the coming year. We are grateful to all of our supporters and were especially gratified to receive a gift from alumni of \$8,000.
